

My Wooden Carving Treasure Box

Wanan is an aboriginal Paiwan Tribe village in the mountains in Pingtung, Southern Taiwan. In olden days, wooden carving was a symbol of social status, which could be found on the door frames and pillars of the chief's house. During the Japanese Occupation Era (1895-1945), Japanese government set up Carving workshops in old Wanan, encouraging carving plates, utensils and boxes to export to Japan. Since then, wood carving has become a significant skill and tradition in Wanan. The great grandfather of the wood carving teacher, Kulele, in Wanan Elementary School was the first student in the Japanese carving workshop. In this film, the children in Wanan Elementary school are going to tell you how they learn to carve. Each of them chose his/her own patterns which could represent the traditional culture as well as the blessing for future lives. They encountered some difficulties but most importantly, they completed a meaningful task.
